

Doc Hastings' prescription: **Give back**

Richard A. Hastings II, D.O., Ph.D., '80, a former president of the OSU College of Osteopathic Medicine Alumni Association, has established a \$100,000 planned gift to the Marjorie Carpenter Hastings and Richard A. Hastings, M.D., Endowed Scholarship Fund established in memory of his parents. Hastings' father was a radiologist in Ottumwa, Iowa, for many years. His parents were fierce advocates for learning and education and helped shape his philanthropic commitment, he says.

Family contributions and his own previous gift of \$10,000 add to the fund for scholarships for OSU's osteopathic medical students, with a preference to students from rural Oklahoma. Hastings taught at several schools including the University of Alaska Medical School, before deciding to become a physician.

He chose to attend OSU because he liked the philosophy of treating the whole person. As a student, he worked as a janitor in the anatomy lab. As a physician, he often has lectured at the college. He says he has "seen this school from janitor to lecturer" with a grin and a note of pride. Brad Walker, associate vice president for development, says Hastings wants to inspire osteopathic alumni, particularly younger ones, to give and especially wants to see an increase in donations to scholarships.

right way, Pollak emphasizes, saying the high participation rate by student group leaders is a positive sign of the program's success.

Group leaders learn, too. Greg Root, MS-II, says being a group leader gave him practice asking open-ended questions and letting people talk about a problem. "You step back and let them tell you about it," he says. Jazmin Matlock, MS-II, says as a first-year she liked being with a group of peers going through similar experiences. "I can lean on those people now," she says. "The focus was on grades that first year, but well-being matters, too."

Matlock said having group leaders who were opposites, one outspoken and one more reserved, gave balance to the experience. "Being a doctor is about connecting with people, not just physical aspects but emotional aspects, too," Matlock says. "This training helps us as future physicians." Root agrees. "I think this will be valuable down the road with patients and it lets you feel like you have helped someone," he says. "That is rewarding in itself."

Plan finalized for OSU Medical Center

In December, an agreement to maintain a graduate medical education program at OSU Medical Center was announced by Gov. Brad Henry. Under the agreement, Ardent Health Services, which owns the hospital, will donate the facility to a city trust, which will contract with St. John Health System to operate the hospital. OSU is committing \$45 million -- \$20 million in funds previously appropriated for our residency program now will be used to help the hospital get back on its feet financially, plus \$25 million to support the first phase of much-needed capital improvement projects. In addition to the \$45 million commitment

from OSU, the hospital will receive \$8 million from the state the first year, followed by \$5 million per year in the subsequent four years; plus a combined \$7 million per year for five years from the Kaiser Family Foundation and St. John Health System.

The Tulsa City Council has approved the trust and eight of nine trustees. One additional trustee is expected to be named from the DO community. The new trustees are: Joan Bartlett Atkinson, Ken Brune, Jay Helm, Jerry Hudson, Ken Levit, Bill Lohrey, Bob Poe and Donald Tyler. The trustees are expected to have their first organizational meeting and begin work in mid-January. The state legislature is expected to vote on appropriation of funds for the teaching hospital during the upcoming legislative session, which commences in February.

Stress management program marks two decades

If you graduated from OSU-COM after 1988, chances are you took the stress management program, which marked its 20th anniversary in Fall of 2008. It began when Susan Redwood, Ph.D., and others launched a federally funded substance abuse prevention program for medical students. "My part was developing the stress management program to help students cope with stress," Redwood says. The peer-led program has endured, and more than 90 percent of first-years attend.

Dr. Redwood and Michael Pollak, Ph.D. train second-year student volunteers to be group leaders for the first-years. For seven weeks, two leaders facilitate group meetings of seven or eight students. Group leaders do not hand out advice. Instead, they offer suggestions, and caring. Peer support, empathy, talking things through and listening coupled with relaxation techniques and cognitive reframing helps students view problems in a different way. Groups brainstorm, suggest and share possible solutions, but there is no one continued inside
