■ TREATMENT OF METHAMPHETAMINE USE DISORDER

Jason Beaman, D.O., M.S., MPH, FAPA

Dr. Beaman graduated medical school from OSU Center for Health Sciences. He then completed two simultaneous residencies in psychiatry and family medicine. After residency, Dr. Beaman completed a fellowship in Forensic Psychiatry at Case Western Reserve University in Cleveland, Ohio. He holds board certifications in Family Medicine, Psychiatry, Forensic Psychiatry, and Addiction Medicine. After Fellowship, Dr. Beaman completed a Master's Degree in Pharmacology with an emphasis in Forensics at the University of Florida. He also obtained a Master's in Public Health from Johns Hopkins University. Dr. Beaman currently serves as the Chair of Psychiatry and Behavioral Sciences at OSU Center for Health Sciences.

■ BUPRENORPHINE XR: HOW IT'S GOING

Amber Brightmire, LPN

Amber Brightmire is a nurse at the NCWR Addiction Recovery Clinic and is responsible for assessing, stabilizing and assisting patients as they progress into treatment for addiction. She is also responsible for administering medications for opioid use disorder (MOUD) and managing medication schedules. She has held various healthcare roles since 2005 when she received her practical nursing degree from Tri-County Tech in Bartlesville, Oklahoma.

Kelly Dunn, M.D.

Dr. Dunn currently serves as clinical assistant professor of psychiatry and behavioral sciences at OSU Center for Health Sciences. She received her medical degree from the University of Oklahoma College of Medicine and completed her psychiatry residency at OU-Tulsa. Dr. Dunn is board certified in addiction medicine and psychiatry. She enjoys seeing generations positively impacted by holistic, evidence-based addiction treatment providing not only medication-assisted treatment for addiction, but also treatment for problems that lead to addiction at the NCWR Addiction Recovery Clinic. She is passionate about physician and trainee well-being, working to help teach and care for residents and students at OSU Center for Health Sciences so they can have fulfilling, resilient lifelong careers.

■ HOW CLINICAL NEUROSCIENCE COULD RESHAPE THE FUTURE OF ADDICTION MEDICINE

Hamed Ekhtiari, M.D.

Dr. Ekhtiari is a research assistant professor in the department of psychiatry and behavioural sciences at the University of Minnesota Medical School, and is also doing his psychiatry residency in the physician-scientist track. Dr. Ekhtiari's research focuses on reshaping the future of addiction medicine using brain imaging (task based and resting state fMRI) in combination with non-invasive brain stimulation technologies and cognitive training. Dr. Ekhtiari is director of the international network of tES/TMS trials for addiction medicine (INTAM) and the director of the brain awareness for recovery initiative (BARI).

■ SLEEP AND ADDICTION

Lowell Robertson, M.D.

Dr. Robertson graduated from Oklahoma State University in Agricultural Economics/Finance/Pre-Medical Sciences and went to medical school at the University of Oklahoma Health Sciences Center in Oklahoma City. He completed his internal medicine residency training at the University of Oklahoma Tulsa Medical College in Tulsa, Oklahoma and worked for Warren Clinic as an Internist. More recently, Dr. Robertson has completed requirements for a doctoral level teaching certificate at the University of Central Oklahoma through the department of Professional Teacher Education, in Secondary Education. During this time, Dr. Robertson was actively involved in many research endeavors as principle, organizer, and facilitator. Dr. Robertson trains other leaders in the community and serves as Oklahoma's Opiate Education Trainer for Celebrate Recovery and is a State Representative in that organization. He serves on the Project ECHO team and is Oklahoma State University's first Addiction Medicine Fellow.
